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CHAIRWOMAN BRADY: The next item on
the agenda is the Revision to the Proposed
Regulation on Policies for Proceedings
before the Philadelphia Gas Commission.

On August 29, 2024, the Commission voted to approve the proposed regulations governing proceedings before the Philadelphia Gas Commission.

On August 30, 2024, Commission Staff properly filed the regulations with the Department of Records.

On September 27, 2024, the Department of Records received inquiry requests for a hearing regarding the regulations and on November 18, 2024, a hearing pursuant to Article VIII, Chapter 4, Section 8-407 of the Home Rule Charter was conducted.

During that hearing the attending Commissioner and Staff received public testimony from affected citizens on the regulations adopted at the August 29, 2024, meeting.

All testimony was sent to the City of Philadelphia Law Department for review and

potential edits to the regulations in response to the testimony.

The revised regulations are now submitted for final consideration and approval.

We would like to provide the participants with the opportunity to speak briefly on this issue before we call the question to vote.

First we will hear from PGW, Mr. Dasent.

MR. DASENT: Thank you, Madam Chairman.

We have spoken to this issue in detail and in writing and at hearings and prior exchanges with the Public Advocate and others in the room and we stand by our testimony and our position that we need to sort of revisit from time to time procedures for the review of our budgets; and as a part of that we're hopeful that we'll get the widest possible input and that we'll come up with a process that works, and from time to time we'll revisit that process to make sure

that any problems that we have with it can be addressed.

We've done that with protocols, we've done that with other processes before the Commission, and I'm hopeful we'll do that here and I'm hopeful in that sense that everyone can see that it is a fair path forward and that we're constantly looking for ways to make the budget process work better.

Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN BRADY: Thank you, Mr. Dasent.

Mr. Ballenger, are there any statements on behalf of the Advocate?

MR. BALLENGER: Good morning, Madam Chair.

Just briefly, we maintain the position that we espoused in our written comments with POWER Interfaith regarding the proposed regulations.

We're not sure what the revisions to the regulations encompass, but our position is and will be that PGW's customers and

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citizens of Philadelphia benefit from high scrutiny of PGW's proposals; high scrutiny of PGW's ongoing spending; and a detailed, thorough record in which we're able to present our views in contrast to PGW's and which other stakeholders likewise have the rights to do so.

I hope that the Commission has heard those same comments from us a few times now and has embraced them in the revised regulations.

We will certainly look to the revised regulations and hope to see improvements from what was proposed. But as I think we made clear, we do not believe that what was proposed by the Commission was appropriate.

So without knowing what the Commission is preparing to vote on, that's all I can really offer today. Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN BRADY: Thank you, Mr. Ballenger.

Next we will take comments from members of the public. Comments will be limited to three minutes and should be on

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the topic of the proposed regulations.

I'll turn it over to Executive Director McClendon.

EXEC. DIR. McCLENDON: First --

MR. McDOUGALL: Excuse me, Director McClendon.

EXEC. DIR. McCLENDON: Mr. McDougall, we'll take you with the virtual participants. I understand that you represent POWER Interfaith, but if you don't mind, I will call you first among the virtual participants.

MR. McDOUGALL: Sure.

EXEC. DIR. McCLENDON: We only have two members of the public present in the room -- three.

So turning to the members of the public who are present in the room, again, as with the Operating Budget, if you will step forward to the microphone, introduce yourselves again for the record -- I know for the two of you it's a bit repetitious -- and then you will have three minutes in which to speak.

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So we have no idea what we're

commenting on. I would like to think that
you know what you're voting on, that you've
seen it ahead of time, but I can't be sure
of that.

So this really feels like just a sham opportunity for public comment and that's exactly what the whole hearing was about. We had dozens of people talk about democracy, transparency, and the fact that you are a public utility and you ought to be engaging with the public. So to me this is just another example of the Gas Commission who has no interest in engaging with the public.

Thank you.

MR. GREENSPAN: Hi. I'm Steve Greenspan.

EXEC. DIR. McCLENDON: Okay. You may begin now.

MR. GREENSPAN: Okay. Good morning.

I'm a Philadelphia resident and PGW ratepayer. I'm here to strongly support POWER's proposed amendments that were made back in November to restore meaningful

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community participation in PGW's budget process.

I just have to say, one, it's very unclear what is being proposed. There's nothing on the county board of proposed records -- or regulation, rather -- I'm sorry; the City's website on proposed regulations.

And I also want to comment on Mr. Dasent's point about wanting a process. If you truly, truly believed in community engagement and wanting a good process, you would look at the very short list of intervenors that have been intervening over the past several years and engage them in a conversation about how to make this process more efficient, better, and result in a higher-quality budget. You haven't done that. No one from PGW has done that.

So this is now the third or fourth time we're debating these rules. You know what happened in August. In November you recited that. Over 50 concerned ratepayers showed up. And I don't know if you've taken

their comments into account or not. What I
can say is that you've been very quiet about
this whole process.

So let's be clear what you're trying to eliminate in that original proposal.

Last year POWER's expert witness caught a \$2 million error that would have come straight out of our pockets, the residents, the ratepayers.

PGW and Commission Staff claim excluding community voices would make the process more efficient, but this is not about efficiency. It's about accountability, and the results speak for themselves. We have constantly, constantly improved the quality of the budget.

Right now PGW generates millions of tons of gas emissions annually, yet its carbon reduction goals represent less than 1% of those emissions. How will Philadelphia meet its net zero commitments?

EXEC. DIR. McCLENDON: 30 seconds.

MR. GREENSPAN: 30 seconds, okay. You can continue this pattern of

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1	exclusion and secrecy or you can adopt
2	amendments that restore democracy and
3	accountability while maintaining efficiency.
4	You can protect PGW from scrutiny or you can
5	protect ratepayers from \$2 million mistakes.
6	You can silence community voices or you can
7	honor Philadelphia's commitment to
8	transparency and climate action.
9	I urge you not to go ahead with at
10	least the original proposal. I have no idea
11	what's being proposed now.
12	EXEC. DIR. McCLENDON: Mr. Greenspan,

MR. CHANIN: Okay. I am not sure how much I have to add. I don't know if everyone will catch the reference, but I kind of feel like I'm in like a Franz Kafka story right now. I'm being asked to comment on a resolution when I don't know what it says and have no idea how I'm supposed to offer meaningful feedback to something that I haven't seen.

I can't understand how the rules could possibly work that way. It seems off the wall to me that we're supposed to comment prior to a vote when we don't know what's being voted on.

That said, if there are not substantial amendments to the regulation that was originally approved and that dozens of us all opposed, including I believe a majority of City Council members, I mean, in essence what the Commission will be doing is rolling back transparency and accountability, making it harder for us to get information and harder to participate in

extremely important decisions that affect
whether or not people can afford their
bills, whether or not we're safe and healthy
in our homes, and whether or not we have a
livable climate.

I really hope that that's not what's going to happen here. We're living through essentially a fascist takeover of our Federal Government, defunding of essential programs that's making it harder to afford our energy, destroying climate progress, nonstop lies about climate and energy.

We need a maximum of transparency and accountability. We can't have any rollbacks whatsoever.

There was nothing wrong with the original process. It was working fine. The only reason to approve the regulations that were initially adopted will be to shut out the public, and I really hope you're not going to do that.
